English Pale Ale

English pale ale has a rich history back into the 1700s, and as a very popular homebrew style. How many homebrewers' first brew was a pale ale?

The pale ale originated in London in the 1700s, but achieved popularity as the brewers in Burton upon Trent adopted the style in the mid-1800s. Burton upon Trent is located in central England, not far from Birmingham. Given the high sulfates in the ground, the local water is extremely hard. The water contains relatively high concentrations of carbonate, also, but the sulfates are so high that the water's pH is relatively low. All of this means that relatively palecolored malts can be effectively mashed. Other areas of England have water with higher pHs. With those waters, only the use of dark malts can result in a suitable mashing pH. The popularity of pale ales was partly due to their uniqueness when they were first introduced. The sulfate content of the water also enhances the hoppy bitterness of the ale. Bass ale is a common example of a pale ale, although many recognize Worthington White Shield (normally available only in England) as the classic pale ale.

The AHA recognizes English pale ale and India Pale Ale being within the English-style pale ale category. India pale ale is essentially a bigger version of a pale ale, with higher gravity and more hops. Most beer geeks know that India pale ale was brewed to be shipped from England to the British soldiers stationed in India in the 1800s. The beer was brewed strong and bitter to survive the travails of a long ocean voyage.

The AHA considers bitter a different category altogether, although many consider special bitter and extra special bitter (the strongest bitter) to be essentially the same as English pale ale. The biggest distinction is that bitter is a draught beer, and pale ale is a bottled beer. Here are the AHA vital statistics for English pale ale and India Pale Ale, with ESB thrown in for comparison.

New Beer Style Guidelines Coming

Notes from the July Meeting

Rich recalled his favorites, having tried over 100 beers, as well as commenting that the Kölsch beers all seemed too light! (Bob Whritner has offered to give a slide show of the trip in November.)

Rich also commented that the Temecula Festival committee (of which Rich and Teresa are permanent members) is looking for feedback on ways to improve the festival. Planning is now underway for the 2000 festival next may, so if you've got ideas, let Rich or Teresa know.

The Brewer's Corner was a lively discussion of first wort hopping. Dr. Harold asked the question, and several people commented, including Skip Virgilio who mentioned that he was not particularly happy with it. One suggestion was made that this would be good to try as a variable in the next communal brew.

President Tod did the feature presentation on porters. Apparently, since most people present had brewed a porter at one time or another, Tod chose to keep his comments brief.

A number of other topics were discussed at the meeting. These include the upcoming pub crawl on August 14, a Padres tailgate party planned for September 11, and the brand new Strong Ale Homebrew Competition, planned for November and December in conjunction with the Strong Ale Festival. These topics are discussed elsewhere in the newsletter.

- For October, the Club-Only Competition is **Porter!** Time to brew one (Robust Porter or Brown Porter) to brew. Or maybe do both!
- For December, the Club-Only Competition is Winter Warmer. This covers AHA category 10 (English Old Ale and Scotch Ale). It's also time to start thinking about this one, since these usually benefit from a little extra aging.
- You also should be thinking about your Holiday Beer. It
 may seem like the wrong time to brew a nice heavy spicy
 beer, but five months to age is just right for some of the
 traditional holiday brews. Holiday Beers are featured at the
 QUAFF Holiday Party held in mid-December at AleSmith.

Strong Ale Homebrew Competition

QUAFF, the San Diego Brew Techs, and the Strong Ale Festival are coming together to co-host the 1st Annual Strong Ale Homebrew Competition. This will be QUAFF's second officially sanctioned homebrew competition (after America's Finest City Homebrew Competition). This will be a specialized contest focusing only on beer styles with original gravities of 1.080 or higher.

The judging will be held in the last week of November (Saturday, November 27), with entries due between November 4 and November 19. Judging will most likely be held at the Del Mar Stuft Pizza. The winners of the contest will be announced Saturday evening, December 4, at the Strong Ale Festival at Pizza Port Carlsbad. The winner of each category will win a growler of strong ale from one of the microbreweries or brewpubs participating in the Strong Ale Festival. (Of course, the winners will also win the traditional medals or ribbons.) The contest will also feature a competition between homebrew clubs to see which club can garner the most awards.

The 2nd Annual Barley Literates' Octoberfest will be held on Saturday, October 16, in San Marcos. Entries will be due between September 24 and October 8.

Picnic on September 18

The annual QUAFF Oktoberfest picnic will be held this year on September 18 (the official starting day of the Munich Oktoberfest). Once again, we'll be meeting at the island in Lake #5 at Santee Lakes. This year, we plan to make the picnic homebrew competition official, by registering it with the BJCP. This will allow judges to receive experience points for judging, and should increase the caliber of the contest.

Full details will be coming in the September newsletter, but for now, mark Saturday, September 18, on your calendar.

QUAFFsters in Other Competitions

At the **Mayfaire** in Woodland Hills in April, Peter Zien alone preserved the honor of QUAFF. Peter took a third in India Pale Ale, a second in Altbier (behind George Fix's first with a Kölsch), and a second in German wheats with a Berliner Weisse.

At the **Orange County Fair** in June, Tyce Heldenbrand took a first in California common, and a third in German Dark Lager.

At the 12th Annual Southern California Regional Homebrew Championships in Corona in July, Tyce Heldenbrand took first in Barley Wines with an English Barley Wine, and Greg and Liz Lorton took first in Belgian and French Ales with a Framboise (raspberry lambic).

Club-Only Contests

Meads

We finished the QUAFF fiscal year Club-Only competition with a whopping nine mead entries. Charles Hudak took first place with a cherry melomel. Harold Gulbransen took second with a sparkling metheglin (spiced mead), and Greg and Liz Lorton took third with a sparkling braggot. Other entries included three additional meads from Charles (a still cyser, a grapefruit melomel, and a marionberry melomel), a traditional mead by Sandy James, a sparkling elderberry melomel by Harold, and a sparkling raspberry melomel by Greg and Liz.

The final standings resulted in a dead heat between Peter Zien and Harold Gulbransen for first place. Both entrants accumulated 29 points (6 points for each first, 3 for each second, 1 for each third, and 1 point for each contest entered). Through the year, Harold and Peter each took two firsts, three seconds, and a third. Greg and Liz Lorton are currently in third place, but Charles Hudak can conceivably take third if his mead takes a top-three finish in the national Club-Only contest.
