JANUARY PARTY AT THE WHRITNERS'

Mark down Saturday, January 18, for the annual QUAFF get-together at Bob and Mary Jo Whritner's home. This year, the party will include a "communal" brew. Bob will be using his 8-gallon system (as opposed to his other two brewing systems) to brew a pale ale (or maybe a bock, or something else). Bob will be ready to start the mash at 11:00 AM. The festivities should continue into the early evening, with the main dish at 4:00. Like the Christmas party, this will be a pot luck event, with QUAFF providing the main dish. Please bring a side dish, salad, or dessert.

As well as being a good time, this will be a great opportunity to observe a QUAFF veteran in the middle of an all-grain brew. It will be a good chance to solicit advice on brewing systems and techniques, and a good chance to try to stump Bob with difficult questions or to distract him at a critical moment.

The Whritners reside at 2605 Curie Place in San Diego, just north of the 52 Freeway and east of I-5. Exit the 52 Freeway at Regents Road and go north 1/4 mile to Pennant Way. Turn left (west) and follow Pennant Way until it ends at Stresemann Street. Turn left on Stresemann and go south about 3/8 mile to Bothe Avenue (second street on the left). Turn left on Bothe and then turn right at the third street, Curie Place. Look for 2605 on the left (south) side.

SPENT GRAINS

Minutes from the November 19 Meeting recorded by Greg Lorton

The meeting convened at sometime around 7:40 at La Jolla Brewing Company. Guests to the meeting included Steve Wagner (Stone Brewing Company) and his wife (Laura), and two friends of John Bell, John (Morrow?) and Tom Kelly.

Harold and Barbara Gottschalk, who recently returned from England, reported on their sojourns to a bunch of pubs and brewpubs. Harold highlighted the Roundhouse pub in the West End of London (English ales), Cafe Bohemia (Belgian beers), Finnegan's Wake (Irish beers), Dicken's Inn (English ales), the King's Head and 8 Bells (English ales), and Firkin's Brewery (English ales). (Did I get these right? - GL)

Tim reported on a tour of the Anchor Brewery in San Francisco. Although the tour was not a comprehensive one, it was worthy a pilgrimage for any beer enthusiast. He said that the tasting session that followed included all of Anchor's offerings. He also mentioned that Hop's has opened another brewpub at the former location of R.J. Riptide's. Erol mentioned that Riptide's beer recipes are now being used at Sports City Cafe and Brewery in UTC. Horace mentioned that *Beverages*, & more! have opened in La Mesa. The selection of craft-brewed and imported classic beers is quite large, and the prices are reasonable. (See my comments on the Encinitas Beverages, & more! in page 4. - GL)

In the Brewer's Corner discussion, Randy brought a vial of a wheat beer yeast with a real off smell. He wondered about the viability of the yeast, which was seriously questioned by all of us who smelled it. (All agreed that the smell was definitely solventy. To me it smelled like methyl ethyl ketone!)

Todd Anderson, who brought three beers to the meeting, presented an interesting comparison. He brewed two beers (a Munich Helles and a Kölsch) using identical malt and hop ingredients, but brewing one as a lager and the other as an ale. The difference in tastes between the Helles lager and the Kölsch ale was noticeable.

The traditional January Party will be held at the Whritner's on January 18 (the week before the Super Bowl). Bob is considering a new theme, perhaps a "community brew."

Dion reported on the QUAFF Camp Out, held on the weekend of November 16. Although the turn-out was quite low, those who went had a great time. Those of us who didn't, missed out on a lot of fun.

A discussion about a future pub crawl was held. Last year's pub crawl was a lot of fun, but the number of participants was well below expectations. If a pub crawl is to be held in the future, reservations will be required. Suggestions about destinations included L.A. and Orange County brewpubs, and alternatively, some of the new brewpubs and micros in San Diego County.

Skip Virgilio made the feature presentation on pale ales and American-style ales. His presentation was topped off with a tasting of AleSmith Brewing Company's newest brew, YuleSmith, an IPA. Although Skip said the original idea was to brew only a single batch each year, Skip and Ted may reconsider this decision, based on numerous comments.

The fourth America's Finest City Homebrew Competition will be held on Saturday, March 8, at AleSmith Brewing Company. Entry fees will be \$6 for the first entry, and \$4 for additional entries. The entry window will be February 25 through March 4. Dion is planning a paperless entry system for those with access to the Internet.

Beverages, & more!

Beverages, & more! has opened two "superstores" in San Diego County in the last several weeks. Horace Bixby reported about the La Mesa store at the November meeting. I visited the Encinitas store on November 29, intent on buying a bag of ice for my brewing efforts of that day. I walked out with \$50 worth of beer. I think my selections are indicative of the variety of beer available:

Fraoch Heather Ale (Pictish Ale from Scotland) Samuel Smith's Winter Welcome Ale Grimbergen Triple(Belgian Abbey) Grimbergen Double (Belgian Abbey) Samichlaus Swiss Winter Ale Young's Winter Warmer Buffalo Bill's Pumpkin Ale (brewed in Dubuque?!) Sierra Nevada Celebration Ale 6-pack Sam Adams Cranberry Lambic 6-pack Bornem Triple (Belgian Abbey)

The Samichlaus beer is supposedly one of the strongest beers. I hadn't heard of the Fraoch Heather Ale (but it was pretty good). There are a tremendous variety of imported and microbrewed beers. This includes a wide variety of lambics, German wheat beers, Belgian Trappist ales, English ales, etc. All three varieties of Chimay are carried, but I couldn't find Westmalle Tripel. Compared to the local Von's (which carry a modestly impressive selection of imported and microbrewed beers), the prices at Beverages, & more are cheaper.

The stores claims to carry over 1,000 brands of beer (along with wine, liquor, cigars, specialty foods, and ice). The store also has a frequent buyer club. Although I had \$50 worth of beer, I had a \$10 coupon (local mass mailing) and received a 50¢ on-the-spot discount by joining the Club Bev! discount club. (The Sierra Nevada Celebration Ale was reduced from \$6.49 to \$5.99 for a 6-pack. By the time you read this, a third store will have opened in Carmel Mountain Ranch. (See page 5 for addresses and phone numbers.)

1997 will start a series on brewing processes and equipment to make good beer. The series is designed as a free-flowing exchange of ideas. The program is designed for people who want to go from extract brewing to all-grain brewing, and to let those people who brew with grains to find out how others in the club do it.

The January meeting will kick this series off, and will include a discussion of what kind of equipment is needed to move from extract brewing to all-grain. The emphasis will be on what is the minimum requirement to brew from grains, but we will get into some other readily available equipment that comes in handy. (Sophisticated mashing systems, like Dion's Recirculating Infusion Mashing System, will be presented at a later date.) Bob Whritner will facilitate the first meeting. If you've got slides, pictures, or diagrams of neat gadgets that you have used in all-grain brewing, bring them to the January meeting. Or bring the gadget itself.

Future meetings will get into infusion mashing processes and equipment, decoction mashing, wort cooling, yeast choices, and other topics of interest to the membership.

Also, in January, Erol Kilki will talk about lagers, focusing on the styles covered in the Luscious Lager Club Only contest to be held in March.
